We Be Tripping # 2

We were recently invited along with some of our builders to the Weathertex mill in Heatherbrae, NSW. This trip was amazing and certainly one to remember!

On arrival to Newcastle airport we were almost swept away "Mary Poppins Style". It was blowing a gale! After morning tea and the safety induction we met Mark, our guide for the day, and were geared up to start our tour. We learnt that there is 150 staff at the Heatherbrae mill all working split shifts, the burners go 24/7! We saw the mountains of logs ready to get chipped. All the logs are AFS Australian Hardwoods (eucalypt species) and are sourced within a 200km radius from the mill. There is no waste involved in their logging as good logs are sold to local timber mills, and the offcuts and high feature logs are chipped and used for pulp for the Weathertex range.

The wood chips get sent to the big mason guns. Here the wood chips are cooked and shredded into pulp, looking much like tobacco, then mixed with a paraffin wax. The next step is called the wet lap process, this is where the pulpy waxy timber pushed along a conveyer belt with a mesh below to allow moisture to drain out while it gets condensed into a thick

sludgy sheeting. This whole process also makes the boards naturally resistant to termites as the sugars and starches are extracted. **Did you know because there are no chemicals or nasties you can chip any offcuts you have on site and use in your gardens.** The boards at this stage are 40% moisture content while they get cut into panels with a water jet.

To get the boards moisture content down more they head to 'the press'! Now this part is pretty cool! The boards are stacked into a heat press. This takes about 25 minutes each press. We were lucky enough to watch the press expel the water from the boards. **Did you know Weathertex recycle 100% of their water supply!** In the press the top plate is a nickel base plate which gives the boards the finish (woodsman, ruff sawn etc.) This whole process is on a 24 hour continual cycle.

Once the boards are finished they are sorted and checked for any defects on the way to get re-humidified. This process will get the boards back to 7% moisture before plaining them back to 9.5mm – **Did you know all Weathertex products are the same thickness? This enables you to switch profiles along front façade with ease!** The boards will head to priming (if needed) than back to sorting to ensure no defects before being packed ready for dispatching.

We headed to the boiler room which powers the whole of Weathertex. One of their boilers uses natural gas and the other 2 are fuelled by coal. One of these coal burners was procured from a World War II ship. There was so much history in this 80 year old factory. It was pretty special.

Apart from the fact that Weathertex has a less than 0 carbon footprint, and that they have great durable innovative product lines, we also love their inspiring company values and beliefs. We immediately felt a part of their family and thoroughly enjoyed every aspect of our trip.
